WHAT IS MODERN RHYTHMIC GYMNASTICS?

Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics is a type of gymnastics which is specifically feminine. The rhythmic, dynamic esthetic movement is reflected in the personality of the gymnast. Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics (MRG) conforms to the principles of human physiology and refines and perfects the movement by a continual neuro-muscular action.

The educational aspect, open to all ages, involves simple gymnastics, beautiful, interesting and with limited difficulties. This develops to a more complex sportiv rhythmic gymnastics. At this point, the difficulties, the speed of execution, the intensity are more distinct. The esthetic character, the originality of the sequences and of the technical element, and the appropriate musical accompaniment contribute to a high virtuosity resulting in the competitive form of the elite sport. At this level, there are both individual and group events.

However, regardless of the level, the exercises have common characteristics. They are usually performed with hand apparatus such as ribbons, balls, hoops, ropes and clubs. The gymnast has to harmonize the movements of her body to those of the apparatus she uses.

MRG can express individual fantasies as well as group harmony. It allows women to reach a motor and psychic balance, joy and serenity, through elegant, rhythmic coordination, surety and correctness of movement and physical beauty.

WHAT IS THE HISTORY OF MRG?

Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics was developed at the beginning of our century. The idea was to modify "women's gymnastics" so it would be a more appropriate form of physical activity for the female body. Some of the founders were George Demeney (1850-1917) a French physiologist, Emilie J. Dalcroze (1865-1950) a Geneva music teacher, Rudolf Bode (b. 1881) of Germany, and Ernst Idla (1901-1981) an Estonian who founded a MRG movement School in Sweden.

MRG became an internationally recognized sport in 1963. Budapest hosted the first World Championships and 28 contestants from nine European countries were present. Since Budapest, the World Championships in MRG have been held every two years in various parts of the world. The first international competition with a Canadian team took place in Cuba in 1971. Kalev-Estienne Club gymnasts were judged among the top 14 countries in the world.

Both the Canadian Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics Federation and the Ontario Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics Federation were founded on April 24, 1969 by Mrs. Evelyn Koop. Since 1951, Mrs. Koop and her students have been responsible for developing MRG in Ontario and Canada. In 1971 Tamara Bompa and Marta Selmeczi and in 1974 Lilliana Dimitrova added their knowledge and talents toward helping to develop the Canadian Competitive concept of Rhytmic Gymnastics. The first Canadian National Coaches were Tamara Bompa as individual coach and Evelyn Koop as group coach.

THE IDLA METHOD

Ernst Idla, creator and founder of the Idla method, was born in Estonia 1901 and died in Stockholm, Sweden in 1980. He studied medicine, psychology, pedagogics and physical education in Berlin.

The Idla Institute was founded 1929 in Tallinn, Estonia, where Ernst Idla was trainer of track and field. In 1944 Mr. Idla fled from the U.S.S.R. occupied Estonia to Sweden, where he gave his first performance in Stockholm's Konserthus 1945.

At the Festival of Ling (Lingiaden) in Stockholm 1949, where 20.000 gymnasts from all over the world were gathered, Ernst Idla was the director and choreographer of the Festival of Light (Ljusfesten) at the Stadium. This event became an international breakthrough for IDLA.

A totally new idea was born in the world of gymnastics with the Idla method. Its basis is scientific and theoretical, and includes adjustments to age, sex and ability. In a constant interchange the Idla method applies the physiological principals of work—rest, and the psychological principles of stress—relaxation. The ball is used as a tool and rythm instrument. Quality of movement is what the method is aiming at. The unlimited richness of movement with the Idla method results in an advanced form of exercise while creating a choreographic dance program. The Idla form of exercise is to equal degrees building physical fitness and mental stimulation.

The principles and work methods of Ernst Idla are now well known and accepted.

Highlights of Idla ensamble

A group representing Idla has been touring the U.S.A., Canada, Centraland South America and also Europe for a number of years.

The Idla method has been taught through courses, classes, lectures and work shops at different Universities, Ballet and Dance Festivals and also at Athletic Festivals in many parts of the world.

The American public has had the opportunity to see the IDLA method during their many TV performances, e.g. at the Ed Sullivan Show, U.N.'s 25 year Gala in New York, the Mike Douglas Show, Good Morning America and many others.

Their latest tour of the U.S.A. in 1983 included 7 cities on the east coast where they gave 33 performances in 21 days. They also participated in the Scandinavia Today activities in Minneapolis.

Since 1977 there is an Idla Center in downtown Stockholm with education and work shop activity. Approximately 1500 students get their training there today. Special courses are available for participants with back problems, for which the Idla method has developed a program yielding good results.

The Idla method is applicable for both men and women, girls as well as boys, young and old, beginners and advanced. It gives a base for other physical activities especially athletical and therefore serves as a motivation for physical exercise and education in children and young people. Since his death in 1980, the work of Ernst Idla has been administered by

a non-profit organization—the Idla Foundation—and his daughters Ingrid Idla and Daisy Idla Nilsson. Harriet Gustafsson it the foundation's managing director.



MALMÖFLICKORNA—THE MALMOE GIRLS

A school for the cultural movement of moderns rhytmical art founded an directed by Leida Leesment.

Malmöflickorna-Malmoe Girls started in September 1954 and consists today of more than 1,000 members divided into groups from 5 years of age and upward.

Malmöflickorna's Selected Troupe is an outstanding proof of the high quality of the school and the results which can be reached within its activities. Especially the ball program is considered unique in the world. They also use ribbons and veils and have several numbers with singing and dancing.

Since their international break-through in 1958 the Selected Troupe has been very sought-after for top-level engagements all over the world in many varying circumstances withing festivals and cultural fields.

They have made over 900 performances including 78 tours to 23 different countries and more than 80 TV shows indicating a lively interest in this

exclusive group.

In 1969 Malmöflickorna where nominated to represent Sweden at the Gymnastique Moderne World Championships in Varna, Bulgaria. The result was remarkable. Among 14 countries—without really having Gymnastique Moderne as a speciality-Sweden was the only west nation to be in the final. They are no longer participating in competitions. There was an exception made in May 1983. The Selected Troupe participated in an international televised competition in Israel—Telegym. The group won an overwhelming victory. This victory together with the fact that Malmöflickorna at every world gymnastic festival since 1961 have been selected among the best groups at the festival shows a completely unique series of highclass achivements.

In 1980 Malmöflickorna celebrated their 25th anniversary with a gala performance in the precence of His Majesty the King Carl XVI Gustaf of

Every year they have one of two evening performances at the Malmoe Theatre with 500 girls showing programs with different degrees of difficulties and every year on June 6, when the Swedish National Holiday is celebrated in Malmoe, they give a mass performance with about 500 airls.

Malmöflickorna have become the group which has represented Sweden several times in most different connections such as World Congresses for Physical Education, World Gymnastic Festivals, Cultural Weeks and World Exhibitions.

- -7 times at the Sport Press Festivals in West Germany
- -Frequent engagements at World Congresses for Physical Education in Sweden and abroad
- -4 tours to Israel
- -4weeks' engagements by Tetra Pak in Taiwan including TV-shows
- -Several Swedish cultural and commercial campaigns abroad
- -6 performances in connection with Cultural weeks in United States, Italy, Denmark, Finland and Sweden
- -Participating in the Festival Gala Evening in Stockholm at the Estonian World Festival 1980 with 10.000 spectators. Staging and Choreography-Leida Leesment
- -Standing invitation to traditional mass performance at the Swedish National Holiday.

Leida Leesment, the director, has been awarded several honors and medals and in 1976 she was appointed "The Leader of the Year".

In 1975 Malmöflickorna was appointed "The Club of the Year" and three years later they received the Cultural Scholarship from the city of Malmoe.

QUESTO RHYTHMICS

Questo Rhythmics, founded more than thirty years ago, is a lively, energetic rhythmic gymnastic troupe from Montreal. The club emerged from the former Montreal Estonian Sport Club and was later renamed the Estonian School of Modern Gymnastics. Presently it is known as Questo (Quebec plus Esto) Rhythmics.

The club spans many levels of competence, from novice to individual world class competitive.

The Questo Gymnasts have performed at all Estonian world festivals and innumerable ethnic functions representing Estonians. Other performances include Expo 67, XXI Montreal Olympics, Man and His World, T.V., etc. The club is presently coached by Hilja Paul.

For over thirty years, the Kaley Estienne Gymnastic Corporation has been actively promoting rhythmic development in Canada. Founded in the early 1960's from the Estonian sports club Kaley, Kaley Estienne has now grown to an organization of hundreds.

Under the dynamic and inspirational guidance of its founder and Artistic Director, Evelyn Koop, Kalev Estienne has introduced Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics to thousands of Canadians, making it famous through in-

numerable performances by the elite groups across Canada.

Canada became fully aware of Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics during the Centennial Year when the group gave fifty performances at Expro '67 with the most prominent performance of the year on Parliament Hill in Ottawa for Her Royal Highness Queen Elizabeth and Prince Philip.

Mrs. Koop and her girls have continued to promote the sport by giving countless seminars and demonstrations throughout high schools and universities in Canada, the United States, Mexico, Europe, China, Australia, Israel and many other countries.

Among the many international travels of Kalev Estienne, the trip to China in May of 1978 has been an example of their unremitting drive. Kaley received rave reviews everywhere they performed.

The club has grown into a multicultural organization of children, teens and women who enjoy MRG for pleasure, recreation, fitness and competition.

EVELYN KOOP is the artistic director of Kalev Estienne gymnasts and she is a specialist in Rhythmic Sportive Gymnastics. A part time lecturer of Physical Education at the University of Toronto, she holds the Degree of Brevet, the highest qualification of the International Gymnastic Federation. An international judge and coach for the Canadian Sportive Rhythmic Gymnastic Federation, Mrs. Koop is now working on the committee for the development of Canadian gymnasts.

Evelyn Koop is the author of a number of specialist publications such as Judging. "School Development Program", "Basics of Modern Rhythmic Gymnastics", and the National Coaching Certification Manual Level I.

1975- annual show at the St. Lawrence Centre was a great success.

1976- participated in the opening and closing ceremonies of the 1976 Olympic Games in Montreal and in the Disabled Olympics in Toronto.




In Canada she has worked since 1978. She has conducted seminars, clinics and workshops for students, teachers and coaches throughout
